

Throughout five decades, the unique contribution of these adults has remained a vital instrument in Christian living for youth in the Archdiocese of Indianapolis.

We take this opportunity to thank all who have joined in this effort and pray for their continued work on behalf of our young people. By far, the most valuable assistance is given to youth through the CYO by simply providing them opportunities to be associated with Christian adult leaders who continue to foster spiritual, mental and physical development in our youth.

Remembering The Beginning — A CYO Was Formed

The Catholic Youth Organization was offically established on February 1, 1939 by Bishop Joseph E. Ritter. From its humble beginnings, the history of the CYO is a story of dedication and love. It is a story which has no ending as it continues today in the same spirit and enthusiasm that was established 50 years ago.

The Catholic Youth Organization has grown from almost nothing in 1939 to a very successful and worthwhile organization in 1989 and today remains an organization of, for and on behalf of youth only. It goes without saying that the CYO was not organized for volunteers but without those thousands of volunteers including the young parish priests, financial donors and the Community Chest (now the United Way of Central Indiana) in 1952 the CYO would not be celebrating its Golden Jubilee in 1989.

A few people are still around who can remember meetings that were held in late 1938 and early 1939 at the Knights of Columbus Clubhouse on North Delaware Street in Indianapolis to discuss the idea of forming a youth

organization of some kind for boys.

Records show the initial idea came from Father August R. Fussenegger and Father Charles Schoettlekotte, Chaplains of the Knights of Columbus, Bishop Joseph E. Ritter and a few additional K of C members. However, upon persuasive arguments from Father Albert H. Busald at a meeting of the K of C Council on December 12, 1938, that any youth organization should be for both boys and girls, the CYO was formed and almost immediately Father Schottlekotte was named the first Indianapolis City Director of the CYO by Bishop Joseph E. Ritter.

It is sincerely believed that K of C member Joseph M. Culligan is one of the original committee of three appointed on or about October 31, 1938, by John J. Blackwell, grand knight of K of C Council No. 437 to work with several priests on the new idea of forming a youth

organization in the city.

On November 28, 1938, the idea of CYO was discussed at a K of C meeting described as "the largest and most

representative gathering seen in years."

At another large K of C meeting on December 12, 1938, Jack Elder, than athletic director of the Chicago CYO and former member of the great Notre Dame football teams of 1928-30 was the keynote speaker for a discussion on youth organizations in Chicago, Detroit, New York, Milwaukee, Cincinnati and San Francisco. Most of the leaders in the Chicago CYO, according to Elder, were the young priests, who acted as moderators and coaches.

Similar meetings were also held at the Catholic Community Center on North Pennsylvania Street, where probably the idea of the new Catholic Youth Organization originated from Bishop Ritter, Father Fussenegger and Father Schoet-

At an additional meeting on January 16, 1939, a joint committee composed of members of the K of C and Indianapolis clergy adopted a resolution providing for a

general committee to foster the development of CYO. Also, during a meeting on this same date, a motion was adopted donating \$250 to start CYO.

At a dinner meeting on January 31, 1939 at the Columbia Club with Bishop Ritter presiding and John K. Ruckelshaus as chairman, it was decided that a campaign for funds for CYO would commence February 1, 1939 and conclude on February 15, 1939 with the goal of raising \$12,000.

Father Busald, Peter G. Reilly and Thomas Quinn were chosen to serve with Bishop Ritter on the Advisory Board and a central office for coordination of CYO activities was established at the Catholic Community Center under the direction of Father Schoettelkotte.

With a newly organized board and money in the treasury, CYO began serving area youth. John Patrick Rooney of Schenectady, New York, was selected as the first lay director of CYO and Marjorie Boyle was employed as secretary, a position she would hold for the next 40 years.

The first official activity of the CYO was a city-wide spring dance held in the Cathedral High School Auditorium, attracting more than 1000 youth representing every parish in the city.

Director Rooney lost no time in organizing leagues at three levels for the baseball season with entries from parishes for the parochial league, 12 entries from parishes for the high school league and 14 teams signed up for the K of C senior league. A tennis league was also formed and steps were taken to organize a drama contest and other activities.

Almost from the beginning, the CYO in Indianapolis, as in Chicago, was energetically and enthusiastically supported by the young priests in the Indianapolis parishes. They became the moderators and coaches, especially in football.

From here, CYO progressed well and there were more activities for boys and girls of all ages to participate in — grade school, high school and senior groups.

The CYO experienced a few growing pains as well, such as a shortage of money for all of its many and varied activities. Many early CYO board members tussled with financial problems, however, time and time again, one or more board members quietly, privately and even secretly got the job done.

Two such board members were Frank McKinney and Francis Wilhelm. No one knows to this day how much these two men did for CYO without anyone knowing about it except for a few board members who by chance found out, usually long after the money and deeds were forthcoming.

The Catholic Youth Organization takes great pride in the fact that it has touched thousands upon thousands of young lives since 1939 and is greatly appreciative to all the dedicated and caring volunteers and financial donors who have given so much of themselves to help make the CYO what it is today. These unselfish adults along with the youth have helped to build the golden memories of CYO.

The Beginning — 1939

The Catholic Youth Organization was officially established by Bishop Joseph E. Ritter on February 1, 1939, with assistance from an organizational committee composed of K of C members from Council No. 437, headed by John Blackwell, and a group of interested priests, headed by Monsignor Albert Busald. The CYO began operations as a department of the Catholic Charities Bureau.

Beginning with the appointment of Father Charles Schoettelkottee as the first Indianapolis deanery CYO Director, the CYO was off to a fast start. Under the direction of Father Schoettelkottee, the CYO set out to supplement the Catholic home and schools in the care and education of youth. Hoping to attach young people to the church and to provide them with a good environment for their youth activities, the CYO developed spiritual, social, cultural and athletic activities according to the needs of youth.


In 1939, existing parish football, basketball, base-ball and softball programs were placed under the direction of the CYO. While these programs already existed for the grade school age children, a need for high school programs was immediately recognized. Therefore, a boys' softball and basketball league was organized for the high school students. The first CYO dance was also held in 1939 in an effort to bring the

high school age youth together from throughout the city for a social gathering. In addition, the senior CYO conducted a golf tournament and other programs were begun to augment the Christian living experience young people were receiving at home and in schools.

In 1939, an apparent need of teenagers was the need for social contacts. It is not surprising then that the Junior CYO program flourished with social events such as dances, picnics and parties of various kinds. The CYO sought to provide these programs within the very shadow of the church or in such a fashion to foster attachment to their parish church.

As the years went on, other needs became apparent such as making youth aware of their Archdiocesan newspaper through participation in the Criterion Quiz Contest or encouraging more interest in cultural activities through the CYO style show and baking contest. The CYO also instituted a swimming meet, golf tournament, tennis tournament, table tennis tournament, talent contest and one act play contest to help teenagers develop their various God-given talents.

Serving the CYO in 1939 along with Father Schoettelkottee was Patrick Rooney, Executive Secretary and Marjorie Boyle, Secretary. Miss Boyle remained with the CYO as secretary until her retirement in 1978.



In the early days of CYO table tennis was one of the most popular indoor activities. This 1940 photograph was taken in the Little Flower Parish Clubroom. This sport certainly has not changed much over the past 50 years.

The 1940's

Father Maurice Dugan assumed the responsibility of directing the CYO in January, 1940. During his short tenure, the first CYO Board of Directors was formed with Edward J. Fillenwarth, Sr., as chairman.

Communications were vastly improved in the early 1940's with the publication of the "CYO Bulletin." The Bulletin was mailed to local CYO members in all theatres of World War II with Frank English and Charles Fleetwood as the first editors.

In September, 1940, Father Richard Langen was appointed CYO Director. During his 2½ years of service, he organized a junior youth council. The purpose of this council was to coordinate activities among parishes in the Indianapolis Deanery. Jack Nelson of Our Lady of Lourdes Parish was elected as the first President of the Council.

In 1942, Father Langen was placed in charge of Sunday afternoon and evening socials for the servicemen at the K of C hall and was responsible for providing chaperones and entertainment. The program continued through the war, thanks to the cooperation of the Knights of Columbus, the NCCW and many parishes that provided food and labor for the operation and the CYO.

Father Richard Kavanagh began a 12 year term of office as CYO Director in June, 1943, and is largely responsible for the organization of the CYO on the Archdiocesan level. A great deal of expansion of activities and participation occurred during those 12 years. In 1943, the CYO assumed the operation of the Catholic Salvage Bureau with Fred Haunss acting as manager. In 1945, the CYO sponsored a weekly radio show on WISH called Youth and Religion. This effort fostered growth of CYO throughout the Archdiocese.

To meet the growing demands for the central organization of CYO on the Archdiocesan level, Archbishop Ritter elevated Father Kavanagh to the position of Archdiocesan Director of the CYO. Additionally, the first deanery directors were appointed outside In-

dianapolis by Archbishop Paul C. Schulte.

In 1945, thanks to the great generosity of Mr. and Mrs. Bert Dingley, the CYO received 280 acres of land in Brown County. Thus the CYO Summer Camping Program began, a program which has meant so much to the youth of the Archdiocese. The camp was named Rancho Framasa in honor of the Dingley's three daughters, Frances, Martha and Samuella. The first camping season in 1946 consisted of two sessions, one for the Junior Catholic Daughters of America, under the supervision of Miss Winifred Galvin. The other session was held for the St. Philip Neri Boy Scout Troop with Mr. J. Earl Owens acting as director.

To prepare for future developments, a camp committee was formed with Monsignor Albert Busald, Pastor of St. Philip Neri as chairman. The camp was given a grant by Lilly Endowment for a water filtration system and additional money was received from Archbishop Schulte for the construction of a dam for the present reservoir lake and Mrs. Fred Haunss who led a children's camp drive which provided needed funds for the treasury and popularized the camp with school children of the Archdiocese. In 1948, camp facilities were again improved with the construction of a showerhouse and a bunkhouse, both the gifts of K of C, Council No. 437.


1946 proved significant in yet another respect when the first organizational meeting was held with Mr. Harold Miller acting as chairman for the eventual construction of a CYO stadium. In 1947, a 13.2 acre tract of land was purchased at 16th and Harding Streets at which site the CYO Stadium was to be constructed. A stadium committee was immediately formed and Frank E. McKinney was named chairman. A fund drive was begun to obtain money for the development of the property. Construction began on the stadium in 1948. Formal dedication of the stadium occurred September 12, 1949 with Cathedral and Sacred Heart High Schools playing a double header.



The 1950's

The decade of the 50's got underway with great promise and great hope for the future. This hope was bolstered in 1952 when the CYO was accepted as a participating agency by the Community Chest (now the United Way of Central Indiana). Additional camp improvements were made possible by gifts from Lilly Endowment, the Catholic Salvage Bureau and others.

Several new programs were added to the CYO activities calendar in the 1950's. Activities such as the Archdiocesan Youth Council, the One Act Play Festival, the Cadet Hobby Show, the National CYO Convention, the Junior Style Show, the Indiana Catholic Quiz Contest, the Junior CYO of the Year Contest, the Junior Baking Contest, the Summer Junior Baseball League, the Cadet Football Jamboree and the spectacular CYO Parochial School Songfest were all new additions to the CYO programming during the 1950's.

Mr. William S. Sahm was hired in February, 1954, as Executive Secretary. Mr. Sahm served in that capacity and later as Executive Director until his untimely death in 1973. In January, 1955, Father John P. Elford was named Archdiocesan CYO Director, succeeding Father Kavanagh for the next 12 years.


The first CYO Banquet was held in February, 1954, in the K of C Council 437 Auditorium. The highlight of the banquet was the presentation of the St. John Bosco Medal to 12 volunteers for outstanding service to youth. Mr. J. Earl Owens, Mr. and Mrs. Fred W. Haunss, Mr. and Mrs. Larry V. Zapp, Mr. and Mrs. Bert Dingley,

Miss Winifred Galvin, Mrs. Agnes P. O'Connor, Miss Marjorie Boyle, Mr. Edward J. Fillenwarth, Sr., and Mr. Leo S. Evans became the first recipients of the highest honor bestowed upon a CYO volunteer.


Improvements in the CYO camping facilities continued in April 1955 when a drive was begun to provide funds for the construction of a swimming pool at Camp Rancho Framasa. This project was completed with the construction of an olympic-size pool in 1956. Among others, Bernard W. McGinty was instrumental in the completion of this facility. Additionally, George Desautels, Sr., spearheaded a committee which provided \$2,300.00 for the building of a handicraft shop at Camp Rancho Framasa.

Improvements were also made to the CYO Stadium during 1955-56 as Frank E. McKinney contributed funds to construct a new pressbox and a cinder running track to the facility.

In an effort to meet the increased demands of a flourishing program, two part-time assistants were added to the CYO staff in 1957. William F. Kuntz and Leo J. Mahoney became the newest members of the staff. The rapidly growing programs also made it necessary to increase the size of the CYO office. Thus, in 1958 funds were provided by Archbishop Schulte and the Lilly Endowment for the construction of a new CYO office next to the CYO Stadium. The move was made in August and the Archbishop formally dedicated the building in September.



A week at CYO Summer Camp can be a very memorable and enjoyable event. These six young ladies undoubtedly had a few good stories about their stay at CYO Camp Rancho Framasa to take home to their parents.



The Catholic Youth Organization Office was located on West 16th Street from 1958 to 1979. This familiar building was familiar to youth and adults who participated in the programs and activities sponsored by the CYO.



The new CYO Office on 16th Street was formally dedicated by Archbishop Schulte in September 1958. Father John Elford, CYO Director at the time, and Monsignor Henry Hermann assisted the Archbishop in the dedication.

The 1960's

The hope and promise of the 1950's gave way to steady and continued successful programming in the 1960's, with more and more youth participating than ever before. During this decade, several new adult advisory committees were formed to help lead the CYO to even greater heights of success. In addition, three new tracts of land were developed for use by the CYO helping the organization to keep up with the ever increasing and varied needs of youth.

In 1960, land was purchased for a new girls' camp in southern Brown County, thanks to a contribution by Mr. and Mrs. William B. Ansted, Jr. Upon the recommendations of Mrs. Ansted, the new camp was named Christina and plans were made to begin the camping program in 1961. The first camping season at Camp Christina offered five one-week sessions. The Inland Container Corporation Foundation provided \$15,000.00 for the construction of a water filtration system and building.


The CYO has always been blessed with groups of adults who have given physical, financial and counsel assistance to the organization. Three such groups were begun in the early 1960's. The St. John Bosco Ladies Guild was formed as a ladies' auxiliary, with the specific purpose of aiding the CYO through a

planned series of events. Mrs. Fred Haunss was elected as the guild's first president. A Priests' Advisory Committee, consisting of priests from the Indianapolis Deaneries was formed and began functioning in 1963. A Public Relations Advisory Committee, designed to improve the communications flow of the CYO as well as enhance its reputation within the community, was formed in 1966.


An increase in existing CYO facilities occurred in 1962 when the CYO Monsignor Downey Athletic Field came into being. This 13.6 acre tract of land at the northwest corner of Perkins and Raymond Streets on the southside of Indianapolis was turned over to the CYO by the Archdiocese. The Monsignor Downey K of C Council 3660 provided for many years funds for the installation and maintenance of the facilities which includes two baseball diamonds, two football fields and a softball diamond. In 1968, the CYO purchased 6.5 acres of ground adjacent to Chatard High School and began developing the new property as a neighborhood recreational area and playground. With the cooperation of K of C Council 3433, the CYO developed the Ray Katzenberger, Jr., CYO North Field which included a baseball diamond, a softball diamond and a football field.



The CYO Talent Contest has always been one of the highlights of the CYO Summer Calendar. Holy Name parish has historically produced many fine participants and winning acts for the contest. These young people from Holy Name presented their rendition of "South Pacific" at the 1965 Talent Contest.





The 1970's

During the decade of the 1970's the CYO began to take a new direction regarding its programming and services. With the structure of many parishes beginning to change, a great deal of thought and planning went into who should be eligible to participate in CYO programs and activities as well as how can the organization better assist adult volunteers in their quest to serve youth to the best of their ability.

In 1970, the CYO Board of Directors expressed concern for providing a better community base for the organization and its activities. Therefore, the Priests' Advisory Committee originated discussions which culminated in the CYO program advancing in additional directions in 1971. Following a two year study of the Cadet (grade school age) eligibility rule, and with the approval of the Archbishop, altered the Archdiocesan charter to include non-Catholic children in that portion of the program. The policy change permitted parishes the option of adding these children to their programs and complete the opening of CYO activities in all age groups.

In June 1973, Mr. William Sahm, Executive Director of the CYO since 1954, died. During his tenure as CYO Director, his boundless energies were devoted to the

expansion and modernization of the varied programs and activities of the CYO. Upon his death, Mr. William F. Kuntz, a part-time program assistant since 1957, was named Executive Director.

Under Bill Kuntz' leadership, the CYO continued to enjoy growth in both its programs as well as its effect upon the lives of young people. In addition, facilities were continually upgraded. Major improvements occurred at Camp Rancho Framasa and Camp Christina in 1974, with assistance from Lilly Endowment and other corporate grants. Perhaps the biggest change in facilities, though, occurred in June 1979, when the CYO office was moved from the 16th Street address to the remodeled Latin School building.

In 1974, the CYO began to offer training programs for its adult volunteers in an effort to provide good Christian leadership for the youth participating in CYO programs. The initial training experience was called SPERO and additional leadership seminars were conducted in 1976 through 1978. This training experience was good but the need to have the volunteer training programs under one umbrella became apparent. Therefore, in late 1979, the CYO Leadership and Service Institute was proposed as the certification program for CYO volunteers.

Marjorle Boyle was hired as a CYO secretary in January 1939. Following a career with the CYO which spanned 40 years, Marjorle retired in 1978. Marjorle was also recognized for her service to the CYO by being selected as one of the first recipients of the St. John Bosco Medal in 1954.

The 1980's

After 40 years of serving youth, constantly growing and changing to meet their needs, the CYO looked to the future to develop programming and services to meet the wholistic needs of youth. Youth ministry programming was sweeping the nation and in the early 1980's the CYO developed its own youth ministry program to meet the spiritual, emotional, physical, educational and social aspects of a young person's life. Of course, the traditional CYO programs which had been evolving the past 40 years remained the cornerstone on which the future of the organization was built.

Continuing with the development of the CYO certification program for adult volunteers, the CYO created a new staff position in March, 1980. The Administrator of Volunteer Services was responsible for the creation and implementation of the new certification program. In October 1980, the first Leadership and Service Institute was conducted. The purpose of the institute is to encourage supervisors to develop their qualities of leadership within a Christian reference and to refine their skills as effective youth ministers. Additionally, the institute serves to make supervisors more aware of the psychological and spiritual impact they have upon the young participants.


In June 1980, the CYO created a second new position, the Administrator of Teen Services. This new position was responsible for working with the high school age youth participating in the programs and activities offered by CYO. In addition, this new administrator was charged with the task of developing

the CYO youth ministry program.

In 1983, Archbishop Edward T. O'Meara, S.T.D., asked the CYO to support and act as a resource for parish and deanery youth ministry. Since then, efforts have been made to develop and implement various leadership and training programs for adults and youth. The CYO office works to coordinate and communicate with deanery and parish representatives in carrying out the vision of youth ministry in the Archdinese.

Since 1983, participation and involvement in CYO Youth Ministry has increased dramatically with more high school age youth participating than ever before. CYO Retreat programs — (Quest, for freshman and sophomores; Search, for juniors and seniors; and Christian Awakening, for seniors), are filled to capacity. The CYO Archdiocesan Youth Conference attracts over 800 youth each year and young people from all over the Archdiocese have actively participated in pro-life activities, peace and justice workshops, Christian Leadership Institutes and the Advent Vespers Service. Participation in the traditional CYO youth activities of athletics, cultural, social and service programming has remained constant giving further hope for a very bright future for the CYO.

Programs such as the National Youth Ministry Certificate Program, SPERO, Interim Program and various inservice days have involved and trained adults acting as youth ministers to better meet the growing needs of youth in the Archdiocese.

That is to say that the CYO will continue to serve the needs of the youth of the Archdiocese of Indianapolis to the best of its ability. And, with the continued advice, assistance, loyalty and friendship of caring adults willing to give of themselves for the betterment of youth, the CYO will certainly meet the challenges presented to it within the next 50 years.

SEARCH FOR CHRISTIAN MATURITY Searches - 3; Participants - 115

The CYO Search for Christian Maturity is basically a weekend experience in a dynamic Christian Living. The program is an instrument through which the Holy Spirit speaks to and directs young people through the words, actions and lives of their peers.

It is an attempt to establish a community in Christ, The community consists of team members and/or teeanage/ young adult searchers. A search weekend is an opportunity to meet new people; it is not a mysterious, magic formula that will convert young people and commit them to Christ forever. Its principle purpose is to give youth a deeper insight into the meaning of life — to be lived in today's world. Its unique genius is the youth to youth approach. The majority of the 10 - 15 member team are young people who have made their own Search who wish to share their experiences with others their own age. The Search is designed for Juniors and Seniors in high school.

QUEST RETREAT PROGRAM Quests - 3; Participants - 125

The name Quest itself conveys a "searching for," "a coming to long for," "a journey." We in the program proclaim to all involved in it, to take the risk to find the real you. We stress that it is not a retreat as such, but a getting together to find out more about ourselves, friendships, and God . . . an experience. If the participants come away with a deeper insight from the program, then we feel it is an added evidence that God's grace is at work. Through discussions. games, talks, movies, scripture, skits and much, much more, the Quest Retreat centers around the three circles of life: Love of God, Love of Self and Love of Neighbor. The program is open to all freshmen and sophomores in high school and is an exciting mixture of fun times and serious times, working together with other young people.

CHRISTIAN AWAKENING RETREAT

The Christian Awakening retreat specifically designed for seniors in high school was recently added to the CYO Retreat Program. The Christian Awakening Retreat was initiated in the CYO Program primarily for Catholic students who attend public schools and who would not have the opportunity to attend such a retreat through their high school. In addition, the Christian Awakening Retreat is also used by deaneries within our Archdiocese who either do not have enough seniors to provide this retreat or those who have too many students, but can not provide more than one Christian Awakening a year. The Christian Awakening Retreat is a dynamic experience which takes an indepth look at the participants, attention to where they are in terms of themselves, others and God. It allows the student to come to an appreciation and value of themselves as a young adult, as well as an appreciation and value of those particular people in their lives — especially parents, relatives and friends who make their lives meaningful. There was one Christian Awakening Retreat in 1988-89 with 60 participants.

RETREAT TRAINING WORKSHOP

Sessions - 1; Participants - 52

This retreat training workshop has been designed to help prospective team members to sharpen and broaden their retreat skills. This three-day Retreat/Workshop is open to all high school and college age students who have a desire to share with their peers. We feel this workshop is a retreat experience in itself and can be used as a tool for parishes who wish to have their parish youth trained for retreats in their backhome settinas.

CHRISTIAN LEADERSHIP INSTITUTE

CLI's - 1; Participants - 91

The institute offers an opportunity for leadership development through an intense period of learning and community living. The program is an indepth experience in community building, communication skills, leadership, organizational skills, and personal growth. This will enable each young person to take a leadership role in parish or school youth ministry. The process includes skills development, worship and recreation.

INTERIM PROGRAM

Interim is a program for dedicated Catholic men and women, young in both mind and spirit, who are willing to give two years of their lives in serving the church in youth ministry. An applicant should demonstrate leadership ability and be at least 21 years of age.

YOUTH MINISTRY CERTIFICATE PROGRAM

A program in Youth Ministry designed specifically for those desiring specialized knowledge and skills in Youth Ministry. The two year program integrates course work, basic theological understanding and culminates in a youth ministry project. Students in the program will receive a Cetificate in Youth Ministry. Courses may be taken for graduate credit. The twelve credit hours earned by a student in the Certificate Program can be applied toward the MRE or MTS degree at St. Meinrad School of Theology.

1989 YOUTH MINISTRY LEADERS DAY Date: September 16, 1989

This day reacquaints us with the importance of utilizing our own experience for the basis of our own spiritual growth. By growing through our own experiences we can help young people to trust and learn from their own experiences. This program was held in Columbus, Indiana at St. Columba parish. There were over 100 present that day.

I WANT TO LIVE WORKSHOP

The goals of this particular workshop sponsored by the CYO enables the participants to begin to clarify personal values concerning specific life issues. The workshop also provides training for persons interested in facilitating this experience in their own parish, school or deanery. This workshop is presented on a yearly basis.

CYO CAMPS

A PROGRAM DESIGNED FOR YOU

TRADITIONAL CAMPING (Ages 8 - 15)

A Traditional Camping experience is available to boys and girls at Camp Rancho Framasa and Christina. A day at CYO Camp is creatively structured so there are a variety of opportunities which encourage deeper understanding of God, self and others. Through participation in programs such as camp crafts, horseback riding, handicrafts, swimming, canoeing, archery, camp-outs and a challenge course, the campers come to know the wonders of nature and the joy that comes with self confidence in newly acquired physical, social and mental skills.

PRE-ADVENTURE CAMPING (Ages 11 - 13)

The CYO Pre-Adventure Camping Program is available at Camp Rancho Framasa only. In addition to participating in all traditional day and evening camp octivities, campers will experience the excitement of a half day canoe trip down Flatrock River and the challenge of spelunking in the limestone caverns of southern Indiana. Pre-Adventure Camping is available each week to a limited number of campers on a first come first serve basis.

ADVENTURE CAMPING (Ages 13 - 15)

The CYO Adventure Camping Program is available at both Camp Rancho Framasa and Christina for boys and girls who want greater challenges than what traditional resident camping can offer. Adventure Campers should be in good physical condition as they will camp-out three to four nights, cook almost all of their own meals, participate in an overnight canoe trip, backpack on a half-day wilderness hike and a fullday spelunking excursion in the limestone coverns of southern Indiana. Adventure Camping is available each week to a limited number of campers on a first come first serve basis.

ACTUAL WILDERNESS EXPERIENCE CAMPING (A.W.E., Ages 13 - 15)

Actual Wilderness Camping (A.W.E.) has been developed for the older, more experienced male campers who want to participate in a program that emphasizes rustic outdoor living skills designed to help them become self sufficient. The unique aspect of the A.W.E. Camping Experience is that campers live in a platform tent deep in the backwoods of Camp Rancho Framasa. Campers will learn group cooperation as they pack and carry all needed food, water, clothing and toiletries for the week. In addition, campers will learn map and compass reading, wildlife tracking and identification and environmental awareness. This program was offered to a limited number of male campers for the week of July 9 - 14 only.

CHEERLEADING CAMP (Ages 8 - 15)

Cheerleading camp is a popular program held at CYO Camp Christina for girls who are interested in becoming cheerleaders or who wish to improve their cheerleadina skills and learn new techniques. In addition to offering all the features of a traditional camping experince, CYO Cheerleading Camp provides the opportunity for participants to share ideas and techniques under the guidance of high school and college cheerleaders, while at the same time enhancing the development of CYO sportsmanship and ethics.

NEW FOR 1989 SONRISA CHALLENGE COURSE

The Sonrisa Challenge Course is a low ropes, 19 station obstacle course which has recently been constructed in the beautiful woodlands at Camp Rancho Framasa. The course which will be available for all age groups using Camp Rancho Framasa presents various non-competitive challenges that are designed to enhance skills in the areas of leadership, problem solving, communication, self-esteem, trust, decision making and team work. It is anticipated that all campers can test their skills on the Sonrisa Challenge Course during their stay at camp.

The camp areas are available for youth and adult retreats, family and group reunions, school and church meetings and conferences. Family camp and retreat weekends take place in the spring and fall. The CYO Camps also support environmental education and serve as an appropriate classroom. The CYO would be glad to help you in the planning of your event. For rental and program information please contact the CYO office.

CYO CAMP RANCHO FRAMASA (BOYS AND GIRLS)

Total 1989 Attendance at Camp Rancho Framasa - 902

NOTE: Rancho Framasa offered in 1989 three weeks for girls and three weeks for boys. The figures listed here include only campers during the regular summer season. Also attending camp on weekends during the year are more than 2,000 members of Junior CYO units, Junior C.D.A., Boy Scout troops, Girl Scout troops, High School Marching Bands, plus various young adult groups, parish groups and school groups. One of the attractive programs at Rancho Framasa is horseback riding, which was instituted in 1964 and expanded the following year. A recreation pavilion was added to the facilities in 1966 and the kitchen was renovated in 1972. In the fall of 1973 and extending into the spring of 1974, a new winterized water system was installed at the camp. A new pool deck was laid and the pipes around the pool were replaced, lavatory and shower facilities were added to each of the four older cabins. This was done with the hope that the camp could be used more often and longer into the colder months by groups who wish to enjoy the great out-of-doors.

CYO CAMP CHRISTINA — (BOYS & GIRLS)

Total 1989 Attendance at Camp Christina — 400

NOTE: The 1989 season at Camp Christina was the 29th in the camp's history. The camp offered seven one-week sessions. The staff is composed of a combination of Senior and Junior Counselors. The campers are housed in tents erected on concrete floors, with two counselors living in each tent.

The property for Camp Christina was given to the

Archdiocese by Mr. and Mrs. William B. Ansted, Jr. Mr. Ansted, who is deceased, was a member of St. Thomas Aquinas Parish and a member of the CYO Board for many years. Although more development remains to be accomplished in future years, the camp has been most fortunate in that a number of individuals and firms, including the Inland Container Corporation Foundation, the Monsignor Downey K of C Council No. 3660, Stark & Wetzel employees, and the Bell Telephone Pioneers, have contributed to the material progress of the camp. The most recent improvements include a pavilion adjoining the kitchen facilities, constructed in the spring of 1980 and a new dock was constructed around the swimming lake in 1986.

The CYO gratefully acknowledges all gifts which have made possible this fine facility and the extension of our camping program. We are especially grateful for the assistance of the St. John Bosco Ladies' Guild, organized in 1962, which has contributed substantially to the CYO camping program.

CYO CAMPERSHIP PROGRAM

In 1989, thanks to increased assistance from individuals and groups, the CYO was able to offer, in whole or in part, a camping experience to 150 children who otherwise would not have been able to attend. Our special thanks are extended to the St. John Bosco Ladies' Guild, the Catholic Salvage Bureau, the K of C Councils, and many private donors, all of whom provided the necessary funds and coordinating work to allow this program to grow and flourish.

SCOUTING AWARDS

I LIVE MY FAITH AWARD FOR GIRLS AGES 9 - 11
The "I Live My Faith Award" is the official religious recognition program of the United States Roman Catholic Church for girls (ages 9 - 11) enrolled in the Girl Scouts of the USA, the Camp Fire Girls, Inc., The Junior Catholic Daughters of America, and the Junior Daughters of Isabella. In a diocese, this program is administered and supervised by the Diocesan Youth Director or an authorized delegate. Diocesan Youth Directors may extend the use of the program outside of an organizational setting by permitting groups of girls together with adult moderators to engage in these projects in

parishes.

The Marian Medal is the award of the Roman Catholic Church in the USA for girls enrolled in the Girl Scouts of the USA, the Camp Fire Girls, the Junior Catholic Daughters of America, and the Junior Daughters of Isabella. In a diocese, this program is administered and supervised by the Diocesan Youth Director or an authorized delegate. Diocesan Youth Directors may extend the use of the program outside of an organizational setting by permitting groups of girls together with adult moderators to engage in these projects in parishes.

PARVULI DEI AWARD FOR CUB SCOUTS

This award is a recognition that the Catholic Church gives to the Cub Scouts and Webelo Scouts for advancement in religious knowledge and spiritual formation. Its purpose is to help the boy become more aware of God's presence in his daily life, especially within his home and community.

AD ALTARE DEI AWARD FOR BOY SCOUTS

The purpose of the award is to help scouts develop a fully Christian way of life. The program is organized in steps, based on the Sacraments. These encounters with Christ are our best means toward spiritual growth.

FAMILY OF GOD AWARD FOR 2ND AND 3RD GRADERS

The Family of God Program is an activity series developed to compliment the catechetical efforts of the parish and family with children in 2nd and 3rd grades. The parents and adults who serve as advisors to the children help them to grow in religious awarness by talking about the experinces that make up the program.

POPE PIUS XII AWARD FOR SENIOR SCOUTS AND EXPLORERS

This award is for Scouts of high school age and Explorers of the Catholic faith. If the young man is a Scout in a troop, he must have received the Ad Altare Dei Award before he can qualify for the Pope Pius XII Award. Girls in Exploring are eligible for this program.
